CILAS course : For Lack Of A Better Word? Interrogating the Literal

1. Course Description:

It's often argued (in the university, politics, public life, and elsewhere) that clarity and precision in language are necessary for effective communication. Recent trends in linguistics, however, suggest that metaphor is a natural outgrowth of the way human cognition is organized - indeed, that our experience of the world is often *rooted* in metaphor. But these arguments come with certain assumptions: why is the literal taken as default, and the non-literal as somehow aberrant? Is this truly a natural consequence of human cognition and semiotics? And to what degree is it influenced by the material and social conditions under which linguistics has developed as a academic discipline?

On this course we will try to interrogate this notion of 'the literal'. Rather taking a linear or chronological route, we will weave between angles - beginning with 'modern' academic and applied linguistics, moving through esoteric and spiritual approaches to language, and into considering the role of the non-verbal in communication. The final session will be dedicated to reflection, and for participants to present their thoughts on metaphor, the literal, and everything - if anything - in between.
