

Visual philosophy

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Let's turn the introspective power of philosophy into art!

Visual philosophy is an experimental concept of crossover between philosophy reflection and artistic production. This class invites you to join a collective talk about basic philosophy notions. We will study the foundations of each philosophical notion, discuss it, and find in which ways they apply to our individual and collective realities. The goal is then to transfer our understanding of it into colors, shapes and textures. It is a class about building a bridge from your unique thought structure to your unique way to visualize the logic you just built while thinking. This class requires no technical skills at all, only the desire to explore the within, get inspired and inspire.
